Once again the Springfield Art Guild is honored to have a show at the Franconia Government Center. Lee District Supervisor Jeff McKay has been a wonderful supporter and friend of SAG for many years. They have a very nice reception at no charge to SAG. Our People's Choice awards will be selected by the votes of the guests on the day of the open house reception 1/25/14. First, second and third place winners will be announced in the SAG newsletter.

All persons interested in participating in the Franconia Government Center show are welcome to submit up to 5 pieces of art. This is not a juried show so all submissions will be considered. If the number of submissions exceeds the space available some works may not be accepted. At least one work from each person who signs up will be hung. Hanging space will be the determining factor on the number of pieces that can be hung. We will do our best to announce to the participants in advance of the hanging if the number of submissions from each person needs to be reduced.

• All work must be framed or presented on gallery wrap canvas (with sides finished) and proper wiring on the back of each piece by secure screw eyes. Hanging wire must be place high on the back of each work so that the work will lay flat against the wall. Matted work must be clean, well cut and dust free with clean glass. A weight restriction will also be imposed (Heavy pieces cannot be hung). Any work that does not meet these minimal standards will not be accepted.

On the Back: Each work you bring to be hung must have an identification tag attached to the back. The tag must include:

- 1. Your Name
- 2. The title of the work
- 3. A contact number or E-mail address
- 4. Legible hand written information is acceptable

Three dimensional and relief works are also welcome. A glass case is available to us for the purpose of such presentations. The size of these works should not exceed 12" high X 12" wide X 8" deep.

SUBMISSION DATE:

To allow time to have labels made you must send you submissions no later than January 11th. Once your submissions are made no substitutes or changing will be permitted.

IN THE BODY OF YOUR EMAIL SUBMISSION PLEASE INCLUDE (in the following order)

- 1. Your Name (first then last)
- 2. The title of each work
- 3. The medium with which it was created
- 4. The size (dimensions) of each piece. Width by high in inches
- 5. And your E-mail address AND or a telephone number.
- 6. NO PRICING WILL BE INCLUDED ON YOUR LABLES

Your subject line on your email must include SAG and should read "SAG, Franconia show entries"

Entries will be received starting at 10:00. All participants must be present at the Franconia Government Center no later than 10:30 AM to sign their work in on the day of the hanging. If you cannot be present you are responsible for providing a proxy to bring your work and sign it in on your behalf. As always volunteers are needed. ALL SAG members participating in the show are requested to assist in some way in hanging. If you can bring a light weight ladder please let Reggie know.

The Value of a Critique

January is the month for SAG's annual Artwork-In-Progress critique. At our January 8th meeting SAG members can bring in one piece of artwork to be critiqued by Bobbi Pratte, a professional artist. The idea is to bring in an unframed piece of artwork you are either not satisfied with or are still working on (but not wet) that you would like to have Bobbi critique to provide some suggestions and insights on how to proceed and complete it.

A critique can be a scary thing but at the same time we rely on the result of the critique which is constructive criticism. It is not easy to have our artwork displayed and evaluated but it is an important process to help our work evolve and improve. Some artists cringe at the mere thought of having their work critiqued. The important thing to remember is that the critique is of the painting, and not the painter. It's not personal. There are advantages to having our work critiqued by an art professional because they offer their expert opinions based on extensive training and/or experience, and can be an invaluable addition to our overall art education. As individuals, we learn just as much from seeing someone else's work being critiqued, as we do from a critique of our own work. In a group environment, it's like receiving numerous 'little lessons' for the price of one, so to speak.

The person on the receiving end of a critique has the option, of course, of whether or not they decide to make use of any suggestions being offered by the group, or by an individual critic. But usually there is at least one suggestion that we can learn from and often times there are things pointed out in our artwork that we never noticed, and it is those things that broaden the knowledge of our own talents. We are so involved with our artwork we often need someone's "fresh eyes" to "notice" things for us. Overall there are many opportunities for growth when our artwork is critiqued. I hope you will all take advantage of the critique we have scheduled for Jan. 8th. If you do not have a piece of art you would like to have critiqued, we invite you to come and use this session as a learning opportunity to hear Bobbi's comments and suggestions.

SCAD Museum By Stephanie Bianco

Larry and I traveled recently, and one destination was *Savanna College of Art and Design.* Fifteen years ago, I was a curious tourist discovering a building of student artists working in studios. A colony much like Torpedo Factory, but on a modest scale. That was one big catalyst in my resuming an art practice in my own life, and I deliberately chose to view this again—now through my working artist eyes.

Well, I didn't find that colony at all. It may have been there somewhere, but what we actually encountered was a sensational two year young exquisitely designed building complex containing classrooms, a large gallery, and a six dollar entrance fee. Past the opulent lobby with impressive trompe l'oeil'd ceilings were some contemporary works of photography, sculpture including an intriguing interactive coin and magnet marvel—and video.

Let me tell you about the thought-provoking video. An enthusiastic student docent scooted us towards a room that had several large photos. A woman grimacing. A group of townspeople looking fierce. A stray cat narrowly escaping an approaching train. Uncertain what more to make of it, we circulated next to the adjacent darkened area from which loud sounds of a locomotive emanated. Oh, a film.

Actually there were two: one about two minutes long, another seven or eight minutes, and they were related in subject: a contemporary, surrealistic leap through death's door. You know video is my current interest, and that there's a story to be told. So. How did someone else enact that? I am wondering. There's a youthful woman wandering through a crowd without relating to you, the viewer, nor to her surrounding humans. She spots an apparently attractive red



door, is next seen via successive windows running through the top floor of a brick building and inexplicably bursts out the side—six stories up.

That mystery introduced, she then appears in the next film languidly facing a locomotive barreling towards her, pops into a brilliant blue sky upon impact, and we experience though her eyes disapproving scowls and stares from the humans. Those who prompted her actions? Misunderstood her? Collectively created her?

Feeling both sorrowful and curiously amused, viewers move along with her as she swims underwater in her modest and proper 1960 outfit... her curled hair is not getting wet...and I invite you to dream up your own ending.

Top of the line in its execution, we learn from the rolling of copious credits it was filmed in Hollywood. I didn't learn why my path intersected with this dazzling odd film there at SCAD. On this November 22nd the museum displayed about a dozen very large sculptures, the videos described, a handful of photos, a dark theatre—we found no more.
