INTRODUCING THE SAG SAMPLER: <u>A MONTHLY NEWSLETTER SERIES FOR YOU,</u> BY YOU, AND ABOUT YOU

Have you ever gone on an out-of-town art workshop? If you have, or if you've even just looked into the possibility, we'd like to hear from you. In our May newsletter, the SAG SAMPLER will be a place to share anything and everything you can tell us about out-of-town workshops.

Samples of the diverse information you might find in the May SAG SAMPLER:

40-year SAG veteran Miriam Krebbs writes in praise of a two-week pastel workshop held at a Loire Valley vineyard, in France. Her favorite instructor is quite young and therefore relatively new to pastels. He is, however, an authority on wines. Miriam has given up pastels, but taken up wine. She reports that she will not be returning from France.

SAG oil painter Lydia Jechorek has a tip for plein-air artists in search of an affordable, easy-to-carry way to take a load off their feet. Check out Lydia's discovery at Dick's Sporting Goods: a store-brand chair that sells for \$11.99, weighs less than 3 pounds, and comes in a variety of colors. Lydia reports that other chairs at Dick's were either much heavier or much pricier.

SAG watercolorist Jeb Flint says all that is needed for a week-long plein-air excursion anywhere in the US is a three- by five-inch plastic palette equipped with cakes of red, blue, and yellow watercolor, a paintbrush, a pad of paper, tin cup, hunting knife, compass, matches, flashlight, and a deer rifle.

SAG acrylic artist Ashley Grace Hamilton reports on her weekend plein-air excursion to the wilds of Prince William Forest Park. She says the scenery was pretty, but the Off didn't work. Nor did the zipper on her sleeping bag. The

facilities were inconvenient, and she got poison ivy. Halfway up a wooded trail, the wheels fell off her Samsonite luggage set. She wants to know if anyone wants to buy a portable easel, cheap.

DISCLAIMER: None of the above four reports or identities is real, except Lydia's. I made the rest up. But I won't do that for the May newsletter. In the May newsletter I'll excerpt, cite, rephrase, summarize, or quote in its entirety whatever I get from you on the subject of out-of-town workshops. It turns out the store brand, which is a reasonable \$11.99, weighs under 3lbs. It comes in about 5 colors. The rest of the chairs were much heavier and more expensive. I'm sure other sporting goods stores carry similar store brand chairs.

Albrecht Durer: Master Drawings, Watercolors, and Prints from the Albertina (Vienna, Austria)

March 24-June 9, 2013 National Gallery of Art-East Building

This new exhibition at the Gallery's East Building was very favorably reviewed by the Washington Post art critic, so don't miss it. Beginning March 31st, the Gallery will also feature a 60 minute "Gallery Talk" about the Durer exhibition at noon. The National Gallery writes, "Albrecht Durer (1471-1528) has long been considered the greatest German artist, uniquely combining the status held in Italian art by Michelangelo in the 16th century, by Raphael in the 18th and 19th centuries, and by Leonardo da Vinci in our own day. While Durer's paintings were prized, his most influential works were his drawings. watercolors, engravings, and woodcuts." One of my favorites, "Tuft of Cowslips" is featured on the National Gallery website description of the exhibition (http://www.nga.gov/exhibitions/durerinfo.shtm). This exhibition from the Albertina of early German art presents 91 Durer watercolors, drawings and woodcuts along with 19 drawings and prints from the National Gallery's collection.

It's Time to Paint Outside

My dad always used to say, "Money is never wasted on education." I've found that to be true with painting. I've never taken a painting or drawing course or workshop



that wasted my money – I've always learned something that kept me engaged in painting and wanting to learn more. I decided to learn how to paint in 1995 and started with drawing 101 at the Art League School. It wasn't long before I started painting classes and was immediately drawn to the idea of painting outside. I grew up with three brothers (and a tomboy sister) and a scout master for a dad, so camping was a way of life with my family. Plein air painting was for me. I also found that I was most comfortable painting from observation, as I just could not make up the image.

Although there are many excellent plein air painters and instructors in the Washington area, I'll just focus on three that I've studied with. Even at my age (I just retired after 40 years as an association executive and teacher) I love to be "the student" – one whose only job is to listen and learn and try something new. Ross Merrill, former chief of conservation at the National Gallery and premier plein air/landscape artist, was my first plein air teacher. Although Ross is gone now, I spent some of my happiest times in workshops with him and his lovely wife Alice. Ross loved the Chesapeake Bay and the countryside surrounding Washington (still my favorite place to paint), and Alice loved Ross

and taking care of his students. I'll never forget my first plein air workshop in Tilghman Island, Maryland where I tried (in June) to paint outside with acrylics and a 20"x30" canvas.

The canvas kept

blowing off the easel, it was sweltering hot, and the bugs kept sticking to my canvas when I could keep the paint wet long enough to get it on the canvas. The group laughed, ate and talked well into the night about painting, being with nature and "living the good life." Google "Ross Merrill artist" and take a look at some of his lovely paintings. You'll think you're on the Eastern Shore. I continued to study with Ross for the next 5+ years and absorb all that he had to share about equipment, techniques and the pleasures of plein air painting.

Ross and several other landscape painters formed the Mid Atlantic Plein Air Painters Association and started "Paint Annapolis," one of the first paint outs in the Washington area. MAPAPA is a healthy organization today of over 400 plein air artists in Pennsylvania, Maryland and Virginia. They host dozens of events (some juried, but most just "get together and paint") a year. Check out their website www.mapapa.org

Sara Linda Poly, formerly of Arlington, and now from Easton, Maryland, was my next plein air instructor. I don't remember my first workshop with Sara, but my most recent one was in an exotic location, San Miguel de Allende, Mexico. Just getting there was an adventure in







itself. My travel buddy broke her arm just before we were to depart, so I took off to "the other side of the universe" all by myself. Sara teaches in Easton, Alexandria, Mexico and other locals and is known for her "clouds." Check out her website at http://www.saralindapoly.com If you're serious about learning to paint plein air, take a workshop with Sara. She provides all kinds of wisdom about mixing greens, painting skies and clouds, creating a color chart, packing to travel, and the best books to read about painting outside. On my way to Mexico, I read Carlson's Guide to Landscape Painting at Sara's recommendation. No pretty pictures, but one of the best guides I've ever read on plein air, and very reasonable from North Light Books.

Lastly, I was able to study with Frederick Markham, assistant professor of art at NOVA's Woodbridge Campus and Art League instructor. Fred took our class trekking into the woods (literally). We stood in the middle of a deep forest one day for 3 hours, painting the trees and


how the light filtered through them. I loved it, although I did more communing with nature than painting, but that's one of the benefits of painting outside.

I forgot to mention, THE LIGHT. For a plein air painter, light and atmosphere are everything, well almost. Half of the battle with creating a plein air sketch is capturing the effect of light on the subject you're trying to paint. Plein air painting has become very popular in the past few years, thus there are many painters who have perfected painting a completed work outside. In fact, I had the good fortune to meet with almost 700 of them last year in Las Vegas at the first ever Plein Air Painters Conference sponsored by Plein Air Magazine. This summer and fall I'll be painting in the Allegheny Mountains, the Adirondack Mountains, Easton, Maryland and Little Cranberry Island, Maine. It sounds like heaven to me, so get out there and enjoy the fresh air!
