Frames Conservator

Martin Kotler has worked at the Smithsonian American Art Museum

since 1981. He holds a master's degree in fine arts from American University. An accomplished artist, Kotler's paintings have

been exhibited nationally and featured in several





solo exhibitions in Washington, D.C. In 2001, he was an artist-in-residence at the Maryland Institute College of Art's Alfred and Trafford Klots International Program for Artists in Rochefort-en-Terre, France. In addition to lecturing on period frames, Kotler teaches at the Washington Studio School. Previously, he worked at the Newark Museum.

SAG-Led, Local Plein Air Outings to Accotink Resume in 2015

SAG members who enjoyed participating in the two "plein air" outings offered in 2014 have asked about plans for similar local outings this year. Members who did not get to participate have expressed interest as well.



The outings allow us to join together in a natural — sometimes secluded — area to paint, sketch and photograph local wildflowers, creeks, meadows, wildlife and other landscape features.

As many of you know, Springfield's Lake Accotink

Park and Accotink Creek are my passion, so the outings I lead focus on these areas or at least within or along the fringes of the Accotink Watershed.

The first plein air outing last year was to a spot along Accotink Creek featuring Spring wildflowers, including Virginia Bluebells, Violets and Spring



Beauties. This outing will be offered again about mid-April with the date to be determined once the Bluebells begin blooming.

Once again, in May, we will visit a site where Pink Lady's Slippers bloom. This large, exquisite orchid,



native to Virginia, is rare. Planning this outing will be tricky as it was last year and dependent on the orchid's cooperation. They were a little slow to bloom last year, but oh when they did, they were magnificent.

Many of us are intimated by plein air painting so I'm working with SAG's

board to plan one or more plein air painting workshops to help us become more comfortable painting outside.



The experience alone is worth the effort. Painting with friends and enjoying each other's company while enjoying nature is a healthy, healing activity.

Françoise Dickson



Françoise Dickson is a native of southern France. She has lived in the US since 1979 with her Scottish husband Allan and moved to Woodbridge, VA in 2009.

Francoise returned to painting after a hiatus of many years raising two daughters and following her husband in multiple corporate moves across the

US and France. Drawing has always been one of her favorite pastimes. While in school, she enjoyed advanced drawing and painting classes as extra curricular activities. As an expatriate, her travels have allowed her to enjoy visiting many art museums around the globe.

Francoise returned to her art when she began taking art classes at the Lorton Workhouse when she joined Marni Maree's art class, "Finish those paintings." With Marni's encouragement, Francoise was able to complete her painting of Collioure, a little harbor town on the most Southern part of

the Mediterranean coast of France. Painting this very special place was also the catalyst of a new adventure for both Marni and Francoise. It was Francoise's beginning of a second career as



watercolorist.

In the summer of 2012, Francoise continued her art experience in the village of Laroque des Alberes, near Collioure, where she owns a home. She even joined a local art group "les Couleurs du Temps."

The high point of these experiences for Francoise was to organize a trip to Laroque in the summer of 2014 with a group of Marni's students to paint scenes from the village and the surrounding countryside. While visiting and painting they also participated in joint activities with local artists. ART TIPS

Removing Paint from Your Brushes and Clothes

Brushes are expensive so you don't want to accidentally ruin one. It happens to everyone... You meant to clean your brushes later and get busy doing something else. Its a shame to throw them away or even put them in the "old" brush container if they aren't a solid mass. The solution is to buy brush cleaners that will remove dried paint from you brushes.

Winsor & Newton Brush Cleaner and Restorer is reasonably priced and works like a charm for both oil and acrylic. Just make sure you only use a little in a jar and don't get the wooden part of your brush in the solution. Remember...it removes paint so you will have a naked brush if you get it on the wooden handle.

Murphy's Oil Soap: A less expensive alternative for oil and acrylic paint is Murphy's Oil Soap. Unlike the Winsor and Newton cleaner, it can be used on your clothes too. Who hasn't gotten paint on their "good" clothes? You walk by a painting in progress and decide it just needs a

couple more strokes and the paint seems to migrate to your clothes every time. Murphy's to the rescue. Carefully rub a little at a time into the paint on your clothes with your finger or a clean rag until the paint looks loose. Then gently wipe as much as you can off and throw it in the laundry. For brushes, put about a 1/4-1/2 inch into a glass bottle and swish your brushes around. Unless the paint is really harden (then let them soak) it shouldn't take more than a couple of minutes to



have your brushes clean and in working order again. Once the bristles are pliable, rinse them in cool water (never hot). Don't forget its easier when you leave a little soap in your brushes for them to hold their edge.

COLOR TIP: USE RAINWATER FOR BRIGHTER COLORS

A color tip to add to your painting knowledge.

GREGORY GADSON: LIFE IN THE INFRARED

In this, the first solo exhibition by Colonel Gregory Gadson (USA, Ret.), Gadson exhibits a new body of work after his retirement. Gadson retired as Garrison Commander of Ft. Belvoir in 2014.

Gadson, a former football player for West Point, became a double amputee in 2007 after his vehicle was hit by an explosive device in Baghdad. Not only was he the first double amputee to become a garrison commander of a major installation, he was also the first soldier fitted with a next-generation powered prosthetic knee. Gadson served as the director of the U.S. Army Wounded Warrior Program and, in 2012, made his acting debut in the film "Battleship".

"The photographs express a new perspective" said Gadson. He aims for photos that capture his scars, but also show his strength and resilience. Using photographic technology, Gadson explore new viewpoints and perspectives.
