Judge for SAG's June Art Show is... **Theodora Tilton**

Professional Artist

The natural environment and solitude are two themes that Theodora T. Tilton continues to explore in her work. She focuses on what she terms environmental landscapes—paintings that combine the reality of the natural environment with personal interpretation. Ms. Tilton is interested in the real and perceived power of nature; the healing, rejuvenation and symbolism found through and in nature. The images are derived from a single or

several journeys where she explores-primarily-the outside world. Earth forms and places discovered on these journeys are the primary inspiration for her work".

Ms. Tilton's work has been shown throughout the United States and published in major artistic journals. Reviews and feature articles appear in the American Artist Watercolor magazine; the Mount Vernon Gazette, the Alexandria Gazette, Washington, DC's Metro Weekly, and the Cumberland Times-News. She received her BFA from the Hartford Art School and her MFA from Syracuse University.

Ms. Tilton has taught painting, drawing, design and illustration for Marymount University, Montgomery College, Northern Virginia Community College and Fairfax County, Virginia.



Awards include: Montana Watercolor Society Margo Voermans Award 2013; National Watermedia Oklahoma Merchandise Award 2010; Georgia Watercolor Society Da Vinci Paint Award 2007; Juror's Award of Merit, The Visual Arts Center Watercolor Annual 2003, Panama City, Florida; Honorable Mention, The Visual Arts Center Watercolor Annual 2003, Panama City, Florida; the Georgia Watercolor Society Traveling Show, 2002; Juror's Award of Merit, West Virginia Watercolor Society Regional Aqueous 1999. Her work is published in The Best of Watercolor, Rockport Publishers Inc.; and Encyclopedia of Living Artists, 11th Edition, ArtNetwork. Commissions include portraits and illustrations for individual and corporate clients.

Ms. Tilton's paintings have been shown in more than one-hundred and fifty juried and individual shows across the country, including the National Watercolor Society Annual. Individual exhibitions have been held in Raleigh, NC; Washington, DC; Baltimore and Cumberland, Maryland; Wilmington, Delaware; Woodstock, Virginia; Naples, Florida; and Birmingham, Alabama. She is a signature member of the Virginia Watercolor Society, the Alabama Watercolor Society, the Baltimore Watercolor Society, the Georgia Watercolor Society, the San Diego Watercolor Society, the Missouri Watercolor Society, the Mississippi Watercolor Society, the Montana Watercolor Society, the Southern Watercolor Society and Watercolor West.

I did little in the way of creative art until nine years ago other than acquire some wonderful original art from my travels. In addition to a lot of higher education, I received a Certificate in Western Art History at the Smithsonian several years ago and continue to study the great artists whenever I can. I began Watercolor Classes about 6 years ago.



Make business cards

 Make business cards with your full name, contact information, and website address, and always have some on you. Whenever you meet someone who expresses interest in your art, give that person a card.

What to do when your painting cap is stuck

- Keep a small pair of pliers among your tubes of paint to use for stuck paint caps. The hardest part of the process is generally finding them!
- Try placing the cap of the tube in between a door frame, then close the door over enough to hold the cap, then turn the tube!
- When the cap on an acrylic paint tube sticks, just invert the tube and soak it for a few minutes
 in hot water; it should then loosen up nicely.
- If you can't get the cap on your tube of paint off, heat it with a match ever so carefully to loosen. After the cap is off, clean the rim and the cap, rub Vaseline (petroleum jelly or glycerine) around the rim and cap; it will work perfectly for years to come!
- A simpler way to get a resistant cap off a tube of paint: hold the cap under the hot water tap for a minute or so, then turn it (possibly using rubber gloves for grip). It works every time.

Mixed Media Art Tips

- Use the plastic bags from your cereal box as a drop sheet or surface cover so you don't get
 paint everywhere! After you've emptied the cereal, carefully open it along the seams, give it a
 wash to get the crumbs off it and set it aside to dry. Now you will have a drop sheet at hand,
 whenever you need it. I've also attached one to a piece of thick cardboard, to create a paint
 board; great for painting those little embellishments, so you can move them aside to dry.
- 2. Use the cereal box cardboard as your inexpensive substrate cut it open and you are ready to go!
- 3. With the credit card painting techniques, for making your own unique backgrounds, you can
 experiment with any paints you have on hand. Different brands and colors will have varying
 thicknesses. Mixing different colors together will bring unexpected results that will surprise and
 delight.

ART TIP FOR HANGING PANELS by Lydia Jechorek

As I was inventorying my paintings for a recent show I quickly realized I needed a plan. Each artist was allotted 4 (four) 3'x6' flats/screened panels for their work. I needed to figure out how many paintings could I hang and what paintings worked together. I also needed to figure how to get my paintings up quickly.

In group shows, you usually are allowed 2-4 paintings so selecting and transporting aren't a problem. Those shows are usually hung in a simple line or doubled up. In a show with lots of artists, we lean the paintings up against the walls as they were dropped off and rearranged them so they work together, then hang them. For groupings of multiple rows of paintings on a large wall, I've laid out paintings on the floor so they could easily be moved around until they worked as a group. With 9 artists in a small space, laying them on the floor or along the wall wasn't going to happen.

I always do some pre-planning to get a layout in my head before a solo show, but that usually changes to some degree once I start hanging. This time, I fell back on my former government training and decided I needed to create a written ops plan.

A couple of ideas

Idea #1 was to get a cloth the size of a panel and lay it on the floor. A cheap solution for that is to cut an old shower liner (heavier than cloth, so easier to work with) that artists didn't toss out because we don't throw away stuff we might be able to use in an art project!! Once you get an arrangement that fits, take a picture with your cellphone and off you go.

Plan #2: I remembered I have panels stored in my garage that I don't use, but loan out to other artists. If you don't have panels and have time you might be able borrow one. It was great to set one up in the climate controlled comfort of my basement. I lined up all the paintings I was considering along the wall and floor. Then I went to

work deciding what worked together and more important... what fit together on one panel.

After I got an arrangement done, I took photos. Since I had multiple panels, I also assigned each grouping a number and wrote the group # on a piece of blue tape on the back of each painting. Then I boxed up the paintings for each panel together. Since most paintings were 20" or under I could get them all into a box. It worked like a charm!

FYI: Whenever I transport a lot of smaller paintings, I take a sturdy box or large plastic container and place a piece of cardboard on both sides of every painting. Once the box is full, but not too heavy, I use bubble wrap or something light to fill in the rest of the space so the paintings do not flop when I'm transporting them. I found that boxing them instead of laying them out flat saves me a lot of trips to my car.

Even though I had the photos on my phone, I also printed a working size black & white copy (1/4 page) which allowed me room to make notes. I hung a copy on each panel (much to the amusement of the experienced artists...although

they hid it well!) so that I didn't have to keep pulling out my phone.

It was a bit more work on the front end, but it turned out to be a life saver for someone who hadn't hung on panels in a long time. Those 27 paintings went up fast!



Russell Kirk Has Us All Looking Up to the Air Force Art Program

The motto of the U.S. Air Force: "Aim High ... Fly, Fight, Win." Many artists of the 10,000 works that comprise the USAF Art Collection know this Air Force derring-do by having lived it.

According to the SAG's May guest speaker, Russell Kirk, the Collection's artists are overwhelmingly comprised of civilians. Yet many created their art in the thick of Air Force battle or rescue operations. Some accompanied Airmen engaged in heroic ground missions, others flew alongside Airmen in combat planes.

One gutsy artist captured the scene while hurtling through the sky with a plane under fire--except he wasn't IN the plane, exactly. To the bug-eyed astonishment of Airmen, he'd tucked himself and his sketch equipment beneath the plane's wing. GAH! And we think WE have a tough time painting plein air!

The Director and Curator of the Air Force Art Program at the Pentagon since 2002, Kirk oversees the care, security, and whereabouts of the collection with the help of two assistants. Pieces are on public display in venues throughout the country and overseas. Others adorn the office space of high-ranking Air Force staff. They convey courage, strength, beauty, and spirit. In hot demand, they also serve as status symbols.

Do any of these coveted creations relocate or retire along with their admirers? It happens. But when it does, Kirk and his staff make it their dignified but uncompromising mission to retrieve them.

All art commissioned by the US Air Force remains Air Force property. The relatively few items not on display

elsewhere are housed in climate-controlled Room 5D855 at the Pentagon.

How does a staff of three keep track of 10,000 world-traveling items? With the help of technology.

Each piece of Air Force artwork contains a chip that enables inventory and identification. In the Pentagon holding room, art is stored on mechanized racks that can rotate through the room and bring forth a requested item on command. Electronic apparatus can instantly confirm the presence of all artwork that is supposed to be there. It can also identify items that have unexpectedly flown the coop.

The Air Force Art Collection continues the long military tradition of using art to record for posterity the experiences of soldiers and sailors at war and in peace. To this end, the Collection covers Air Force participation in battles and, as well, in humanitarian efforts like those conducted in 2010 in Haiti. Kirk remarked that his personal favorite among the Air Force Art Collection might be a painting made of US Airmen and Haitians working to restore life, order, and hope amid the ravages of Haiti's 2010 earthquake.

The Air Force has the third largest US Military art collection, behind the Navy's and the Army's. The youngest of the three branches,



the Air Force began collecting art in 1950 when it acquired 800 paintings from the Army.

Kirk spoke of the program's long relationship with the prestigious Society of Illustrators of New York. A select group of artists culled from this Society was established to further the artistic ambitions of the Air Force. The Air Force has dispatched this civilian group to Air Force installations all over the world.

Others who participate in the AF Art Program are the Society of Illustrators of Los Angeles and San Francisco, a contingent of cartoonists, the Midwest Air Force Artists, the Southwest Society of Air Force Artists, and numerous independent artists have also joined the Air Force Program over the years.

When appointed to his position, Kirk brought a background in communications and public relations but not in the field of art. Even so, he has clearly become a passionate supporter of the Air Force Art Program. He sees it as an important part of military history for generations to come. He continuously explores better business practices, efficiencies, and ways the Air Force can tell its story through the medium of art.

The Air Force does not pay for artists' time or materials, those are donated by the artists. The Air

Force does transport the artists to and from the action they seek to depict. Determined to depict the full and accurate truth of their subjects, some artists have taken up to a year to research the details of their artwork. While photographs are very important to document military missions, it is the artist going into the scene or reliving an event and putting that experience to canvas or paper that allows the viewer to get a sense of the event that can't always be conveyed in a photograph.

Would you like your work to become part of the Air Force Art Collection? To merit acceptance into the Air Force Art Collection, an artwork must portray the people, equipment, activities, facilities, and other historically significant subjects related to the United States Air Force and meet recognized professional standards. Check out the Air Force Art Program website for additional information.

Most of the Air Force collection can be viewed on their website. [See www.afapo.hq.af.mil/] The site lists the artwork by artist, subject, or theme. There is also a 325 page coffee table book in the works, with art from the Air Force collection on every page. The book will be published by the U.S. Government Printing Office (GPO) and hopefully will be available to the public later this year.

Many thanks to Russ Kirk for a great evening of highlighting the

program's exciting aspects for a captivated audience.

SPECIAL NOTE: SAG is planning to arrange a tour of the Pentagon Art later this year. Once a date is established, the membership will be informed for anyone wishing to participate.
