SET UP:

Set up starts at 5:30pm. As people arrive we will enlist you to help with setting up tables for food, gifts, dinning, etc. Feel free to bring a few decorative end-of-year seasonal decorations in order to take the edge off the brick walls for a few hours. Will also enlist help to set up both the **GIFT** EXCHANGE table and the **ART** EXCHANGE table. Easy.

BRING FOOD:

Bring a salad (pasta salad, potato salad, fruit salad, tossed salad etc.) or dessert, or if you feel generous, one of each! Since there are few electrical outlets to access near the food tables...it might be better if whatever you bring, does not need to be kept warm. Anything in a crockpot that can exist with its own residual heat is welcome though!



For anyone who would like to participate in a gift exchange we will have 2 kinds: Artwork exchange <u>AND</u> Art-type Product exchange. Each person can participate in one, none, <u>OR</u> both types.

YOUR CHOICE TO BRING:



- 1) ART for EXCHANGING: A piece of your art, wrapped festively ... Yes, sign your actual artwork, but don't sign the outside wrapping. No size restriction, or media, but suggest you keep it rather small, maybe under 16"x 20"
- **2) ART-TYPE PRODUCT for EXCHANGING:** Bring a gently used art book, or brushes you bought but then decided you did not need, mixing trays, or duplicates of things you have, or purchase a new item if desired. Suggest you keep it under \$10.00. You get the idea! Wrap the item(s) but <u>do **not** put</u> your name on it.
- **3) SEASONAL ART WORK:** This will be used to decorate the chalk ledge on the white board we use. If you have artwork of a winter scene, or other seasonal piece you want to share with us and decorate the meeting space...please bring it. No requirement here....all voluntary. Not for exchange just for décor in order to make the room more festive during our party.

The Social Painter


Building Her Own Art Community

"Art led Lydia Jechorek to a career as an agent with the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI). Twenty- five years later, her work as an agent influences her approach to art. The Burke painter couldn't have predicted that her skills as an artist and her work as an FBI agent would click together, but they did. Growing up in southern Michigan, Lydia got her first exposure to law enforcement through her father who was a detective. One night when he needed a drawing of a suspect, he reached out to the closest artist he knew: his daughter. The second time her dad needed help, Lydia drew a composite of a murder suspect. The murderer was caught and Lydia started drawing for local police departments. Although law enforcement intrigued Lydia, she pursued art. In college, she was attracted to architectural drawing, but she abandoned the notion of pursuing it as a career because there were so few women in the field. A few years after graduating from Eastern Michigan University, however, Lydia became one of just over one

hundred female agents in a force of 9,000 FBI

agents. Her background in art proved valuable. When Lydia was assigned work on the bank robbery squad, she gained her coworkers' respect through her art. "I had a skill they needed," she explains. "I could draw." For most of her career, Lydia worked espionage cases. Even though she was an investigator, Lydia's artistic skills came in handy from time to time. "I wasn't able to draw a lot, but just enough to have fun," she says. By the end of her career, Lydia was a supervisor and working 10-hour days, which didn't allow any time for art—on or off the job. In 2003, Lydia retired from the FBI and picked up her paintbrush. But the former FBI agent wasn't the same person she had been in her 20s. She had spent 25 years in a field where teamwork ruled. "In the FBI, there is no 'I," says Lydia. "There is only 'we." Luckily she found a way to marry that mentality with her painting. Lydia, who considers herself a "social



painter," takes classes, serves as vice president of the 100-member Springfield Art League, and exhibits at The Loft, a cooperative gallery in Occoquan that requires its artists to volunteer. She fills

her home with work by other local artists. "They inspire me and make me smile," she says. "I wish I was one of those painters who could paint from what's in my head, but I'm not. I start with a black-and white photo or put the photo away after I start a painting. It's nice that I've grown as a painter so that I don't need the photograph from beginning to end." –Lydia Jechorek Every Tuesday, local painters meet in her home studio to work and critique each other's work. "We don't shy away from the word 'critique.' We're always learning," she says. Some of the things she learns get


posted on her blog. "Once you know something, it's not fun keeping it to yourself," she says. "Artists are pretty friendly people and interested in sharing." Initially after retiring, Lydia looked to others for learning and inspiration. She took classes at the Torpedo Factory Art Center until, she says, "the 20minute ride into Alexandria became a two-hour commute home." Thankfully, the "social painter" had built her own community. Whether she's walking in her own neighborhood or traveling, Lydia carries a camera. She's constantly ready to snap a photo of whatever "strikes her fancy." Her husband has learned that when Lydia yells for him to stop the car, she is serious. Although Lydia works from photographs, she has grown less dependent on the images. "I wish I was one of those painters who could paint from what's in my head, but I'm not," she says. "I start with a black-and white photo or put the photo away after I start a painting. It's nice that I've grown as a painter so that I don't need the photograph from beginning to end." Whether she is painting people and landscapes or shoes and old cars, the one constant in Lydia's paintings is the bright colors. Although she does not have a favorite color, she confesses to being into turquoise. Over time, Lydia's work has become softer. By using larger brushes, she's become more spontaneous and her pictures are less detailed, but she's still particular when it comes to naming her work. She often asks her husband, friends or other artists for suggestions. Her image of a person looking at a painting of President John F. Kennedy at the National Portrait Gallery became "You Don't Know Jack." A painting of a little girl in a tutu and boots became "Uggs and Kisses." Her 2014 show at The Loft Gallery, which featured paintings of brightly colored cars, was called August Hot Wheels. "I couldn't have come up with that name on my own," says Lydia.

Robert Burridge's Tips to Help You Create Better Art

Robert Burridge is a mixed media artist and instructor.

We are so lucky to be living in a time where art and art tips are at our fingertips. There are many good art newsletters online. One of my favorites is <u>Bob Burridge's</u> "ArtsyFartsy newsletters, which always include great tips. He also send out engaging videos he calls "BobBlasts." "Action Overcomes Fear"...just show up. Bob syas if you have any fear at the beginning of a painting you've already started to set yourself up for failure. He recommends stating your goals before you get started. "What do I hope to accomplish?" It doesn't have to be profound, just a starting point to get you into your studio/art space.

"BobBlast" #68 suggests you organize your studio *before* you start painting. Click <u>HERE</u> to view #68's short video

"Preparation is a big deal for me. Before I start a painting, I assemble everything I am going to need. First of all, I make a decision - Paper or canvas. Then, I get out only the tubes of color and the **few** brushes that I need for that painting, and I put everything else away. I keep a water bucket, spray bottle for isopropyl alcohol and paper towels close by - within arm's reach. The only other thing I keep on my painting table is my sketchbook with my written goals and ideas for this painting."
