Our Featured Speaker for March is

Rebecca Solow

Rebecca is an illustrator of children's books, young adult book covers, and much more, with a focus of folklore and fairy tales. Rebecca always seeks to infuse personal meaning

into her commercial work. In 2013 she completed a series of illustrations based on Russian fairy tales, in which she sought to explore her Russian heritage through the lens of her artistic process. Beyond book illustration, her career has had her illustrating everything from wine labels to jewelry designs to concept art for films. In 2009 and 2010 Rebecca traveled to Egypt with the Metropolitan Museum of Art where she worked as a draftsperson doing technical drawings of artifacts at a dig site.

Like many artists, the path to her current work was not always clear. Rebecca believes that when discussing art-making, it is important to acknowledge the struggles alongside the achievements. Rebecca earned her BFA and MFA from the Hartford Art School, where she studied illustration (but was tempted by printmaking and ceramics). Early in her career she struggled to find her artistic voice and a medium she felt comfortable working in. While she always wanted to be an illustrator, she didn't always know the type of illustrator she wanted to be. Rebecca Solow continued



In her presentation to the Springfield Art Guild on March 9th, Rebecca will discuss her career as a freelance illustrator, her process for illustrating a children's book, and how she came to embrace that she is more of a draw-er than a painter. She will also demonstrate the painting method that she developed, which allows her to rely on a detailed under-drawing.

Rebecca has worked with clients such as Cengage Learning, Highlights Magazine, Spider Magazine, The Metropolitan Museum of Art, Bellevue Hospital, and self published authors. She teaches illustration and drawing at the Workhouse Art Center in Lorton, VA.

## February's Show & Share ART TIPS- We loved it!!

Many thanks to all of our SAG Members who came out and shared so many great tips at our February meeting. Not only did we learn a lot of cool and interesting art tips, but had fun taking home art gizmos and gadgets raffled off at the end of the evening. Documenting all of the tips will make for too long an article so will be shared with SAG members via email, but here are a few things we learned:

Judy Wengrovitz brought her latest "lean" plein air kit that all fits nicely in her suitcase! She converted a plastic ArtBin she purchased for about \$8.00 into a painting kit. Two flat lattice sticks are Velcroed in to hold the lid at an angle so the top is used as an easel. Ingenious! A large pill bottle for water and is Velcroed inside the ArtBin to insure it doesn't tip over. A small camping chair fits in her suitcase and don't forget your



an umbrella. Sy did a great job demonstrating how he holds an umbrella over Judy's head... although we're not sure how well he fits in her suitcase.

 Make a mini-mini watercolor plein air kit made from an Altoid tin (and we thought Judy's was small!) It holds everything you might need for a quick little painting. From the "Artist Journal Workshop" blog, CLICK HERE for instructions and photos



 Check out the MVP tool, designed by painter <u>Peggi</u> <u>Koll Roberts</u>. It's an Artists Mirror, Grid-it red Value viewer, and composition Planner. <u>CLICK HERE</u> to see a short video on how it works.



 A budget solution for storing large sheets of paper and supplies can be found at IKEA. The components are table tops and legs. <u>CLICK</u> HERE for photographs



and instructions at <u>JoanathanFongstyle.com</u>.

- Save brushes by using a "Ruling Pen" when using masking fluid. It provides more control when draw lines and is easy to clean up. <u>CLICK HERE</u> to see a tutorial on how to use a ruling pen.
- Plastic film canisters are airtight and great for transporting masking fluid or other liquids. <u>Amazon</u> carries them.

- When oil caps are "glued" on and even pliers don't work, put a rubber band around the cap, carefully turn the cap with the plyers over the rubber band (holding on to the top strongest part of the tube) and voila the caps came right off!
- Check out the Easel Brush Clip <u>CLICK HERE</u> for photos and a video. Perfect for keeping brushes handy.
- Recycle old unsuccessful watercolors by cutting them into strips the size of a book mark and using the backside to test colors. Recycling at its best!
- The Walker Hanging System is a good hanging system and easy to install and use. <u>CLICK HERE</u> for more information.
- Put your pastels in a jar of rice (can be reused many times) and shake to clean them.
- An India ink bottle won't get bumped over if placed in the middle of a roll of masking tape.
- Use white candle wax as a mask on silk, then iron out using a piece of newsprint.
- Don't wash dies out of brushes. Wipe them onto a piece of silk for a wonderful unplanned design.
- Use snow for a unique art method. Put a piece of silk in the bottom of a flat plastic container, cover it with

snow, drip dyes on top of the snow. As the snow melts it makes a beautiful marbled effect on the silk.

- The <u>Schlepper</u> is an inexpensive handle that 'clips' onto the back of a canvas.
- RayMar panel carriers are both sturdy and very light weight.



- <u>Foam pipe insulation</u> covers are an inexpensive solution to protect your frames when transporting. Cut them and slip the over the edges of your frames.
- A plastic T-Square is handy in your art tool kit.
- Scott Shop Towels are made for mopping up oil, as inexpensive as regular paper towels, but last longer and are link free.
- \$2.99 book holders from Ikea make great holders to hold your iPad/tablet or as an easel for small paintings.
- The <u>Accurasee Sketch Caddie</u> holds pencils & pens plus pockets for other things like erasers and sharpener and slips onto a sketchbook with a wide elastic band.

### **New Restaurant Sets**

## Opening Date in

## Arlington

Local art and artists are integrated into the dining experience at **Palette 22**, opening soon in Shirlington Village in Arlington.

ARLINGTON, VA -- Palette 22, a new restaurant with an art theme, will open its doors Feb. 18 at 4053 Campbell Ave. in Shirlington Village, according to a news release from the restaurant.

Owner Alexandria Restaurant Partners is bringing the concept to Shirlington with Corporate Chef Graham Duncan and Executive Chef Antonio Burrell helming the kitchen.

### **Artist concept**

Palette 22 combines food, art and fun, focusing on modern street food small plate dishes with an international flavor. Local art and artists are integrated into the whole dining experience, with painters, mosaicists, photographers and others working during operating hours in dedicated artist workstations.

Most walls are adorned with unique, original, one of a kind artwork, with prices starting at \$20, ranging to approximately \$250. Workstations will showcase local artists at work, while skilled chefs cook in an open "studio" style kitchen, creating fresh and exciting plates inspired from street food, primary around the globe.

The local artists working on site are selected from the regional area to ensure the experience reflects the rich tradition of the greater Washington, DC area as a creative arts destination, and offers meaningful professional growth opportunities for emerging and established artists.



Vibrantly painted surfaces with polished concrete floors, industrial steel elements and inventive use of metals and plywood set the stage for display of the artists' works. Large vibrant murals adorn two major wall sections, behind the bar, and adjacent to the brick oven, painted by local artists.

Additionally, the restrooms each feature unique interior murals; all murals will change on an annual basis to offer guests the opportunity to experience the work of different artists.

The interior of Palette 22 features two main "studio" areas, with floor-to-ceiling windows that wrap the entire restaurant façade. Upon entering, guests will see a 34-seat island bar with surrounding table seating for another 48 guests.

For more intimate dining, the eastern side of the interior offers an 86-seat dining room that wraps around an open kitchen and brick oven. Artist workstations will prominently flank the main entrance, allowing guests to observe, engage and experience artists at work while they dine. A 36-seat seasonal patio on Shirlington Avenue will offer al fresco dining, weather permitting.

### Menu

The restaurant will feature a seasonally driven menu of more than 30 small-plate offerings inspired by street food, culinary traditions, key ingredients and cultural international small plates. Menu prices will be in the \$4 to \$14 range.

Distinctive dishes include:

- **BITES** such as **Ceviche de Verduras**, a vegan ceviche with cauliflower, carrot, avocado, lime, onion, root chips and **Avocado Hummus**, smoked pepper oil, flatbread;
- STREET EATS, Bulgogi Beef, gochujang marinated short rib, ssamjang, butter lettuce; Spanish Style Grilled Octopus, olive oil, garlic, lemon, paprika, thyme, gold potatoes; and Tacos Vampiros, skirt steak, Serrano rajas, avocado, chipotle salsa, queso cotija.
- **BRICK OVEN** offerings include **Asado de Cordero Flatbread**, with roasted lamb, egg, muhammara and **Tandori Shrimp**, head-on shrimp, masala paste, yogurt, katchumber salad.
- **SWEETS** round out the menu including: **Churros de Chocolate**, with hot white chocolate, strawberries; **Flan** and **Apple Empanadas**, with wildflower honey ice cream.

### **Bar Program**

Palette 22 will feature a full bar as well as signature red and white Sangria by the glass or the pitcher; also look for:

- unique, original recipe cocktails inspired by art and artists, (including one on draft);
- an extensive wine list of international varietals by the glass or by the bottle;
- and a minimum of 10 draught beer lines featuring seasonally rotating beers from local, regional, and nationally popular craft and small brewers.

- **Happy Hour:** Monday through Friday, from 4 to 7 p.m.


