

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How to See and Think Like an Artist

SAG's \$1,000 Donation for 2015/2016 Funds Fine Arts Scholarships for Those in Need

SAG's donation to the
Fairfax County Park

(first installment) for 2015
gave 20 individuals in need

the opportunity to receive scholarships to take a wide range of fine arts classes offered by the Fairfax County Park Authority.

These individuals took Pottery for teens and children, Discover Drawing for 6-12 year olds and adults, Basing Sewing for Adults, Digital Photography for adults, and Pen & Ink with Watercolor Washes for adults.

SAG's second installment of \$500 for 2016 was given to FCPF in January to provide additional fine arts scholarships for those in need.

Roberta A. Longworth. "Gifts such as yours
help provide hundreds of scholarships to

64,000 people in Fairfax live in poverty — that is 1 in 17 people! Thus, scholarships are critical for our low-income families to enroll in enriching courses."

Income-eligible senior adults, dependents of income-eligible families and adults with disabilities who reside in Fairfax County may receive up to one class scholarship per quarter

The FCPF supports the Fairfax County Park Authority by raising private funds, obtaining grants and creating partnerships that supplement tax dollars to meet our community's needs for park land, facilities and services.

This partnership helps further SAG's mission of serving the community's interest in fine "visual" arts, fine crafts and photography.

The FCPA will track the number of scholarship recipients and the type(s) of visual/fine arts classes funded through this generous gift. Future newsletter articles will provide SAG members with updates about the second round of scholarships and number of recipients who benefitted from this donation.

Listed below is the Web site for the classes with



Sunday, August 14 - Registration & payment due.

This show is open to SAG MEMBERS ONLY.

Members may enter up to 3 pieces.

Fee: \$10 each or 3 for \$25.

Make sure your membership is up to date.

Monday, August 29th - Receiving 11:00 am - 12:00 pm, Judging 12:00 pm-1pm; Show installation from 1:00 pm to 4:00 pm. Pick up unselected art from 2:00 pm - 4:00 pm

Sunday, September 11 - Reception and Awards, 1:00 pm – 3:00 pm

Monday, October 24 – show take down and pick up art **10:30 am to noon**. Artists must pick up on this date or arrange pickup by a friend. There is no storage space at the venue.

Submission Criteria

For more than 20 years, the Springfield Art Guild (SAG) has partnered with the Friends of Green Spring Gardens Park to create a juried public exhibition and sale of original artwork and photographs.

- ✓ Artwork must focus on flora, fauna, or local (DC, MD, VA) landscapes.
- ✓ Artwork must be for sale and if selected stay on exhibition from August 30 to October 24, 2016 in Green Spring Gardens Park
- ✓ SAG members may submit up to 3 pieces of artwork no larger than 40" x 40" (including frame)
- ✓ Only hand painted, hand drawn or other "original" 2-D art will be considered. Traditional photographs and digitally enhanced photographs are welcome. **Drafts, photocopies, offset prints, lithographs or copies of already published art will not be permitted.**
- ✓ All artwork must be for sale and suitable framed. Entries must be ready to hang with hooks and wire and be protected by glass or plexi-glass when necessary.
- ✓ Saw tooth hangers, clips, wet canvases, soiled or poorly matted works will not be accepted, nor will artwork previously shown at a SAG sponsored Green Spring Gardens show. Exposed nails must be covered by a backing and or tape.

✓ Artists making sales shall submit a 15% commission to Green Spring Gardens Park at the close of the show and are responsible for Virginia sales tax which Green Spring Gardens Park will collect. All sales will be made through Green Spring Gardens Park. Artists will be provided sales details when work is accepted for the show.



"Museums in the Cloud" | Minneapolis Star Tribune | March 6, 2016 is a thought provoking article that tells us technology and art can work together.

Now, rather than fighting technology, many museums are embracing it and it is bringing people back into their fold. Museums once feared that digital media would encourage potential visitors to stay home and peruse collections online. Research and surveys are showing the opposite is happening — audiences are more deeply engaged and more inclined to explore in person. The museums that have brought

technology into the museums are finding both kids and adults alike are loving it so much they are actually seeing a huge jump in attendance.

There are many innovations happening in museums around the country. 3-D images of ancient art are amazing. This spring, the Minneapolis Institute of Art will debut Journeys, an app based on an inch-by-inch indoor map of the venue laid out by Apple. You can use it to create your own pocket-held tour.

SAG's Pentagon Tour of U.S. Air Force Art

The Springfield Art Guild thanks Russell Kirk, Curator of the Air Force Art Program, and Greg Thompson, of the Air Force Art Program for hosting SAG members on a wonderful tour of the U.S. Air Force's magnificent art gracing the halls of the Pentagon.

On April 21, 2016, eight SAG members had the privilege of participating in the tour. The first challenge is getting through security. Much has changed since 9-11. One of our party said he was blown away with all of the security around the outside of the

building and the very tight process of getting into the building. One member was taken into a special room for an additional search! After going through security, we waited in an airport style waiting area which had a small gift shop full of all kinds of things one might or might not expect to attract the interest and money of tourists. A few in our group could not resist the attraction. Where else can you find 50 caliber shell which has been transformed into a bottle opener?

Russ Kirk and Greg Thompson met us at the visitor's entrance and Russ gave us a general briefing about the Pentagon. The Pentagon is a city within itself and though there has been a reduction in the number of people working there, there are still about 2000 military and civilian personnel working there. Russ left us in the capable hands of Greg, who gave us a great tour which lasted almost 2 hours. While it was a lot of walking, we weren't rushed and we were given plenty of time to study the paintings up close. Greg seems to possess an encyclopedic knowledge of the work on display and patiently answered all kinds of questions from the group. It was obvious he loves his job. He provided us with insights and background on the program, as well as background on many of the artists and subjects we were seeing.



While it seemed like there was art everywhere, we learned the Air Force is the only branch that hangs original art in the Pentagon hallways. We were thoroughly impressed by the types of artwork and the range of Air Force subject matter. It covers by a variety of styles, media and artists. The artwork on display at the Pentagon represents only fraction of the artwork in the possession of the Air Force. The rest is in storage waiting for its next exhibit or display around the U.S and the world. Some of the artwork was done by active duty military personnel, the rest is donated by artists who are part of the Program. Through the generosity of the non-military artists and their donations the

program continues to thrive. There are a number of Society of Illustrator artists around the country who work with the Air Force program. About 250 artists are currently working with the Art Program. The Art program has taken a serious budget cuts in recent years resulting in major personnel cuts. The non-military artists sometime accompany Air Force units on deployments to realistically capture what happened. In some cases, the deployed artist takes notes and makes sketches in the field that are brought back stateside and turned into completed pieces of art, some of which was on display during our tour.



Our first stop on the tour was the Tuskegee Airmen exhibit. The paintings were amazing and captured the essence of the Tuskegee Airmen. The details were incredible. There were paintings that even included signatures of some of the Tuskegee airmen. A number of us were very intrigued by Roy E. Lagrone's mixed media paintings. Lagrone was an art director and illustrator who flew with the Tuskegee airmen in World War II. Virginia Fernbach said she enjoyed Lagrone's extraordinary and very

creative paintings/illustrations, many of which were innovative collages integrated into the original painting. Some paintings showed only part of a figure painted and part was left showing the initial graphite drawing. It worked beautifully together. Karen Flann said one of the things she appreciated about the tour was that the art was a mix of methods. The painting of the Tuskegee Airmen was done in amazing detail and then toward the bottom was just a drawing, "I loved that." The painting with the four airmen who seemed to be in the clouds was beautiful.





The exhibit includes a series of 47 graphite portraits by Chris Hopkins.

A very moving exhibit depicts Vietnam Prisoners of War (POW) done by artist Maxine McCaffrey who passed



away in 1979. McCaffrey donated 60 paintings to the Air Force Art Program. Her paintings show realistic depiction that helped bring worldwide attention to captives. Some of the POWs said how amazing it was that "Maxine McCaffrey was able to portray the life of a POW so accurately without even seeing it."



We walked down the hallway of the Secretary of the Air Force's office and other top Air Force officials viewing official portraits of former Secretaries. Karen Flann was impressed that as we were touring we actually went past the Secretary of the Air Force's office, as well as the offices of other officials. Surprising that we could be so close. Ruth Edstrom was intrigued looking at the portraits' details and how the eyes (which followed you as you passed) and hands were done. Greg provided the background of many of the officers and pointed out that even a few of the paintings are giclees. When the paintings were brought back after renovations which lowed the ceilings the original paintings no longer fit in the space.

We talked through an area where Greg explained many receptions and ceremonies are held surrounded by themed work, currently about the Vietnam War.

Jon Strother found several pieces of the artwork on display brought back memories of his time in the Air Force and, as near as he could recall, really captured the conditions.

Where does the Air Force Art collection get new artwork?

The Air Force Art Program works with various Illustrator Societies and independent artists throughout the United States. Artwork is juried by the Societies and is donated by the artist to the United States Air Force.

What are the requirements for artworks to be accepted into the Air Force Art Collection?

To merit acceptance into the Air Force Art Collection, an artwork must portray the people, equipment, activities, facilities, and other historically significant subjects related to the United States Air Force and meet recognized professional standards.
