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The Annual June Members' Art Show

SAG had another enjoyable evening at our June Member's Meeting enjoying everyone's art. We had a great turnout with 33 paintings. SAG extends a special thanks to our guest judge Jean K. Gill.

Jean was wonderful not only for her judging, but her remarks following handing out the awards. We had asked if she could talk about entering shows. She provided some terrific insights not only from a judge's point of view, but also from an artist who has entered many shows and won numerous awards.

As Jean was looking over all of the paintings and began talking about her selections for the winners, these are some of the

comments we heard about those selections: "I can't keep my eyes off of it, there is a rhythm of black moving my eye through the painting, the gray took my eye back, dynamic, the color took on a whole new life, contrast-neutral against bright...you can't do a painting unless it has either value or color contrasts, think about how your eye enters the painting, in this painting all four corners are very different, it's very lively-it captures the mood, great use of complimentary colors-yellow versus muted purple, figures are well done."

Some of the insights we learned from Jean:

- It is important to look at a painting up close and far away. Keep in mind judges may see hundreds of paintings while judging a show.
- Have passages through a painting for the eye to travel, linking different parts.
- Drama usually wins the day, especially from across the room.
- Does the painting capture a mood?
- Make each of the edges and corners of the piece different
- Keeping that in mind, remember a full value range usually catches the eye.
- There is also a tendency for everyone to enter a painting (look at it) from left to right. Something to keep in mind while working on your composition.
- Judges usually want white mats and simple framing. Your mat should be the color of your lightest white, otherwise your mat might appear dirty.
- Studies say double matting sells better
- When submitting digital images:
 - keep a good catalog for your own records so you know when and where you've entered a painting.
 - never show the mat or frame in the photograph
 - make sure it is a quality image, good value control, catches the eye/attention getting
 - proper lighting when taking the photo
 - don't shoot the picture at an angle so you end up having to crop part of your painting off
 - use a tripod to insure you don't have a blurry image (good way to tell is check to see if your signature is clear)
 - know the size requirement for the entry photos (most entry forms will tell you the size they need)

We can't thank Jean enough for being so gracious and in addition to her judging provided suggestions to members who asked for her thoughts on their paintings.

Sunday, September 18 - Reception and Awards, 1:00 pm – 3:00 pm

Monday, October 24 – show take down and pick up art **10:30 am to noon**. Artists must pick up on this date or arrange pickup by a friend. There is no storage space at the venue.

Submission Criteria

For more than 20 years, the Springfield Art Guild (SAG) has partnered with the Friends of Green Spring Gardens Park to create a juried public exhibition and sale of original artwork and photographs.

- ✓ Artwork must focus on flora, fauna, or local (DC, MD, VA) landscapes.
- ✓ Artwork must be for sale and if selected stay on exhibition from August 30 to October 24, 2016 in Green Spring Gardens Park
- ✓ SAG members may submit up to 3 pieces of artwork no larger than 40" x 40" (including frame)
- ✓ Only hand painted, hand drawn or other "original" 2-D art will be considered. Traditional photographs and digitally enhanced photographs are welcome. Drafts, photocopies, offset prints, lithographs or copies of already published art will not be permitted.
- ✓ All artwork must be for sale and suitable framed. Entries must be ready to hang with hooks and wire and be protected by glass or plexi-glass when necessary.
- Saw tooth hangers, clips, wet canvases, soiled or poorly matted works will not be accepted, nor will artwork previously shown at a SAG sponsored Green Spring Gardens show. Exposed nails must be covered by a backing and or tape.
- ✓ Artists making sales shall submit a 15% commission to Green Spring Gardens Park at the close of the show and are responsible for Virginia sales tax which Green Spring

Gardens Park will collect. All sales will be made through Green Spring Gardens Park. Artists will be provided sales details when work is accepted for the show.

I want to give another shout out to <u>Robert Burridge</u>. I am a huge fan. If you haven't looked Bob up online you are in for a treat. Bob is a terrific mixed water media artist, but no matter your medium, he provides useful tips and information that can be used by everyone. He is amazingly generous sharing his insights about his art online. I get his weekly "BobBlast" newsletter and have learned all kinds of great things from him. What's great is all of his "BobBlasts" (mini art lessons) are archived and available to everyone. His latest BobBlast #100 is about art books he reads (including his own, "Loosen

Up and Studio Notes" workbook) and decided to roam through his Weekly BobBlast Archives.

While scanning the archives, BobBlast #46 caught my eye. "Why Varnish your Oil, Acrylic, and Watercolor Paintings?" While he doesn't include pastels in his title he does discuss vanish made especially made for pastels.

"Bob: **Why Varnish?** Every artist has their own favorite techniques for the final coat of their painting. In spite of all the available instructional literature, I am frequently asked to explain what one needs to know about varnishing their own paintings. The following is a short how-to lesson on the subject, complete with a demonstration! Varnish Everything."

Famous Artists School – 3 Volume Set

A set of **Famous Artists School Books** (3 volume set) was donated to SAG last year. The set includes the original publications for an art home study/correspondence course developed in the late 1940s. Below is some info about the documents to inform the SAG Board and SAG members about these resources.

Famous Artists School (FAS) is an <u>art correspondence course</u> institution, in operation since 1948. The school was founded by members of the New York <u>Society of Illustrators</u>, principally <u>Albert Dorne</u> and <u>Norman</u> <u>Rockwell</u>. <u>http://arthomestudy.com/index.php/cac/categories/C39/</u>

The FAS founding faculty were 12 nationally recognized artists, including Dorne, John Atherton, <u>Austin Briggs</u>, <u>Stevan Dohanos</u>, <u>Robert Fawcett</u>, <u>Peter Helck</u>, <u>Fred Ludekens</u>, <u>Al Parker</u>, <u>Norman Rockwell</u>, <u>Ben Stahl</u>, <u>Harold von Schmidt</u> and <u>Jon Whitcomb</u>. Each artist was making more than \$50,000 a year at the time.(!) Brief information about each can be found at: <u>http://arthomestudy.com/index.php/cac/categories/C46/</u>

Later faculty included cowboy artist Harvey W. Johnson and cartoonists Roger Vernon, <u>Al Capp</u>, <u>Milt Caniff</u> and <u>Rube Goldberg</u>. Advisory faculty for the school later included <u>Stuart Davis</u>, <u>Ben Shahn</u>, <u>Fletcher Martin</u>, <u>Ernest Fiene</u>, <u>Arnold Blanch</u> and <u>Doris Lee</u>.



In 1981, The FAS was acquired by <u>Cortina Learning International</u> of <u>Wilton, Connecticut</u>, and continues today, see: <u>http://arthomestudy.com/index.php</u>.

The original courses offered in 1948 were <u>Painting</u>, <u>Illustration</u>/<u>Design</u> and <u>Cartooning</u>. The founders' vision was to make high-quality art instruction available to students across America. The current curriculum includes **Foundations**, **Painting**, Illustration and Design, Cartooning.

The original 1948 price for the three-year course was \$200, payable in monthly installments, and veterans could use the <u>GI Bill</u>. By the 1950s the price was \$300, plus an estimated \$11.55 for basic <u>oil painting</u> supplies. I found sets like the one we have at Amazon listed for \$149.99 and up.

Check Out Gamblin Artists Colors' New Website

Gamblin has launched a new website!! They sent out an email on June 21, 2016 revealing what's new about the site and emphasizing:

- "An important part of their work at Gamblin is helping artists to discover, select, and master the materials and techniques best suited to their artistic intentions. As part of their new site, they've broadened and deepened the images and information at www.gamblincolors.com to help artists find the colors that will work best for them.
- To give painters more visual information about each of our colors, Gamblin created new expandable . color swatches for their Artist's Grade Oil Colors, 1980 Oil Colors and FastMatte Alkyd Oil Colors.
- They've also added new information on Solvent-Free Painting and a library of video demonstrations."

In their Tips and Techniques section, the dropdown features Video Demos, Navigating Color Space, Building Permanent Paintings, Painting Glossary, Studio Notes and Underpainting. I would encourage everyone to not only check out each folder, but read the Studio notes. The Exploring Color Palettes helps artists select a palette of colors that will work in different situations. For example, click on the "Old Masters" palette to see the colors used for a number of subjects including skin tones. ART Opportunities

Have you wanted to include a wild animal in your landscape painting? Or wanted to paint a portrait of a deer, fox or other wildlife? Then taking your own reference shots is a must (see excerpts and a link explaining why below).



The "*Lake Accotink Wildlife Photography*" workshop offers you the chance to photograph Virginia wildlife in their native habitat.

Photographer Tom Kinder has been photographing Lake Accotink Park and it's resident wildlife for many years. He has kindly agreed to share his experience and expertise in a workshop on July 9, 8-10:00 a.m., at the park. (See his photos at: PixJrPics.)

Tom said "Many animals share the park with us, including deer, fox, herons, bald eagles, ospreys, geese, ducks, frogs, turtles and others. An artist can have a strong motive to include a deer or an eagle in a painting and not observe one of these animals in many trips to the park. At the same time, during attempts to observe and capture a photo of an eagle, an artist might see an osprey and get new inspiration."

Here's some short excerpts from "Using Photo References Responsibly from <u>www.thedigitalpainter.com</u> (where you can read the article in its entirety):

"Whenever possible, use your own photographs. You won't have to seek permission for the photograph if it's yours. You will also be able to make the composition look exactly as you want it. With cameras being a part of most cell phones, it's fairly simple to take a quick picture of something you find really interesting."

"Use Multiple Images....Looking at only one photograph cannot give you a sense of how the animal moves. And the way an animal moves is important when trying to create a piece of art. So use several images to get a sense of the animal...."

The workshop is \$40, and students should meet in Lake Accotink Park by the sign board near the railroad trestle and dam. This location is near the large parking lot accessed from the main park entrance.
