# **SAG's Annual**"Works in Progress" Critique

Every year at our January meeting we hold a "Works in Progress "critique. We are fortunate to have professional artist, Chica Brunsvold, to facilitate our critique this year. This is not a judging of a final piece of artwork. This critique is meant to assist each artist in completing their artwork through helpful constructive comments. Many times while we are creating our "master pieces" we get stuck and are unsure how to complete it. We work and rework our artwork but still can't get it the way we want. Critiques from fellow artists can be very helpful and offer a huge insight and learning tool. This year we are lucky to have Chica Brunsvold to critique our unfinished artwork and help us get "unstuck".

Any SAG member who would like to participate can bring in one piece of unfinished artwork to be professionally critiqued. The January meeting is Wednesday Jan. 11th.

#### **Chica Brunsvold**

Chica's area of expertise is her Imaginative and whimsical paintings of birds and animals which she calls Zooillogicals®. She paints almost exclusively on Yupo, a slick, plastic surface that lets watercolor run wild instead of sinking into the paper. The paint stays bright and is readily textured by using stencils, stamps, scrapping, wiping, spraying etc. Chica starts with an open mind, creating all sorts of textures



and patterns, but always with an eye for composition. Then she lets the painting dry and sees what she can "see," - turning the image all around, viewing it in a mirror and in varying degrees of light. Surprising images begin to appear. Chica then sets about defining them so they are visible to others. She puts the paint on, takes it off, and reapplies it sometimes endlessly. This process of tweaking can go on for days and days as she see more and more images develop. This way of working is always a challenge for her, but one she finds to be so much fun.



# **About My Art Background and History**

I was born on Michelangelo's birthday (March 6) so I feel I was destined to a life of creating art!

I grew up in Ann Arbor, Michigan, (Go Blue!) with loving, supportive parents and an older brother who could have made my life miserable but didn't. My encouraged my artistic efforts, urging me to copy images of what interested me. I got to be pretty good at that so they hired an artist to give me art lessons when I was in high school. I also took the "Famous Artists" correspondence course enrolled in a night-school life painting class at the University of Michigan while in high school. But when it came time for college, my father, a Professor of Germanic Languages at the U of Mich. nixed the Art School idea and told me I must enter the College of Literature, Sciences and Arts to get a decent education. I did, but took all my electives in the Art School. My father died when I was a sophomore so I transferred to the Art School for my junior and senior years, graduating on time

because of my accumulated elective credits.

I realized I could not possibly support myself on my painting so stayed an additional year at the University getting an MA in Art and a secondary teaching certificate. I soon realized full days of teaching were not for me. By the end of each day, I was too exhausted to create anything of my own, so I visited the University's employment bureau. I was offered a position at Hallmark Cards but

instead accepted an offer to work at the Central Intelligence Agency as an Illustrator General. I enjoyed the work for five years until our unit of artists was merged with a larger unit of cartographers and a cartographer was put in charge. That was time for me to retire! At that point, I thought I would just paint but instead took a position at the Industrial College of the Armed Forces. I was there about a year when I became pregnant and my husband, a hard working lawyer and associate in a new patent law firm in DC, agreed that it was then time for me to truly retire.

I so enjoyed motherhood! It gave me an excuse to do lots of fun things with our daughter, plus time to take up watercolor. Watercolor is truly my medium of choice, although I do enjoy acrylics too. When our daughter left for college, I immersed myself in my painting and have loved taking workshops, painting, entering shows and volunteering in art activities. For the last 20 years, I have been painting simply what comes to mind rather than what exists in the real world. This has been the most

challenging, rewarding and fun painting I've ever done.

My studio is basically a mess! Paintings are stacked all around...but I have to admit, I seem to thrive in the chaos. I do not need north light as I am not trying to duplicate the particular shapes and colors of nature. While I admire beautiful paintings of nature, my inspiration comes not from the real world, but from what I can see within my own paintings. I paint flat on a pool table covered with plywood. My



palette is a mess too. I used to clean it but realized I was basically washing money down the drain. I do put out fresh paint once in a while, but mainly use what's on the palette - palette dirt! Palette dirt can result in some lovely colors! Probably the best thing about my studio is the view outside - Lake Barcroft, a fabulous small lake in Fairfax, Virginia. Although it's beautiful, it doesn't make me want to paint it. Others can do that. I want to paint what nobody has yet seen. That way, for better or worse, it is completely original~ uniquely and totally mine.

#### **Developing My Style**

I was a realist when I entered art school. but it was the early 60's when Abstract Expressionism was all the rage. So, I got with the program and splashed on the paint. I didn't like it, but did it because it was required. When I finished art school I was still a realist at heart and that was also what was taught in the various watercolor workshops I took. Then at the end of 1989, I took an acrylic workshop which brought the splashing back into play. This time it was fun! After years of careful planning with watercolors, I felt as though I was given free rein. I loved the bright colors of acrylics and painted with them for about 10 years.

In the early 90's I applied for a local one person show but was rejected because I didn't have a center of interest in my



paintings. That annoyed me so much that I furiously repainted the works, noticing that animals and birds were emerging from my wild activity. I became enchanted with them and proceeded to repaint nearly all my existing acrylics, even taking them out of the frames. What a freeing experience that was! When I ran out of existing paintings to redo, I was a bit uneasyconcerned that since I don't see visions, I might not be able to create any fanciful images on blank paper/canvas. But as soon as I began splashing the paint, I was able to perceive fascinating shapes. If I couldn't, I would place the painting at the foot of my bed at night and check it in the early morning light when things could be wild. That was a breakthrough experience. When I saw shapes, I would outline them in chalk so they would be visible in the light and then enthusiastically paint the revealed images. I sometimes still look at my work in the half light, when only the strongest values are revealed and different shapes become apparent.

In 1995, I was accepted by that same local gallery for a one person show of my Zooillogicals®. About 10 years ago, I was introduced to Yupo, a maddeningly slick plastic surface. I actually went back to watercolors which Yupo makes so easy to remove and repaint. Magically, watercolors stayed bright and exciting and it made sense to me to splash them around as well.

I continue to enjoy painting but have mostly retired from national shows which

require a fair amount of time and effort to enter. Old Town Editions has made top

quality giclee prints of many of my paintings, some of which are on my website. If you email me, I will be happy to add you to my mailing list which I use only to announce upcoming shows.

#### **RUTH ENSLEY**

Ruth is an award winning artist, creating art professionally since 1966 in a broad range of media including collage, batik, mixed media, photography, jewelry, and currently watercolor. She has been featured in numerous solo and group shows in Binational Centers, galleries, private collections and exhibits in the United States, Turkey, Saudi Arabia, Madagascar, Mexico, Honduras, Paraguay and Costa Rica. In 2010 Ruth began once again to exhibit in group and solo shows in Virginia and Maryland.

#### ARTIST'S STATEMENT

My subjects have ranged from non-objective designs, people, landscapes, birds of different colors including birds and chickens with an attitude, to flora and fauna with an exotic flavor. I have spent over 12 years in tropical countries five of which were in Costa Rica. I became enthralled with the lush greens of tropical foliage and the vibrant colors of exotic birds and flowers. The media of watercolor allows me to show the beautiful transparencies, textures and the luxuriant color that one might see in a cloud forest or a rain

forest. I have always been inspired by birds exotic or otherwise. They make my heart sing. I hold the hope that my paintings aid in focusing on what would be lost because of the shrinking forests of the world and the unique creatures that live within these forests. I strive to show my interpretations of what I see and feel as I view these tropical treasures.

Ruth is a member of the Potomac Valley Watercolorists, the Springfield Art Guild, the Vienna Arts Society, the Virginia Watercolor Society and part of the Art A La Carte Gallery in Occoquan, VA.

ART A La Carte, an artist-owned cooperative gallery and gift boutique, opened August 1, 2010. It showcases the work of 28 top artists producing a kaleidoscope of gift items including photography, original fine art and prints, one-of-a-kind glass items, jewelry, wood work and textiles. Artists are juried and selected for their edgy vision that compliments the personality of the gallery.

SAG Member, **Jo Ellen Walker**, has her neon artwork in the show "CONSIDER YOURSELF ILLUMINATED " at the Hisaoka Healing Arts Gallery in D.C. The show was reviewed in the Washington Post and is below:

#### **Consider Yourself Illuminated**

By Washington Post



Best experienced when the sun is setting outside the darkened space, "Consider Yourself Illuminated," at the Joan Hisaoka Healing Arts Gallery, spotlights work that pulses, shines and casts dynamic shadows. Lighting is more integral to some pieces than others, but all six participants use lamps, lightboxes or neon tubing to switch on their art.

Ani Bradberry's "Flex" is a chain of hanging rings that dangles from a red-

neon loop. **Neon represents fire in Jo Ellen Walker's "Sacred Spaces," whose red-painted logs appear to burn inside a crib.** Robin Schaefer places wax-layered prints atop lightboxes, evoking the dwindling flickers of remembrance.

Melissa Burley's found-object collages glow from inside, using LED or halogen light whose ephemerality contrasts the mostly metallic ingredients. Her largest piece, "Bending Time," is a seven-foot tower made of bicycle gears, piano strings and backlit glass blocks.

The show's other magnum opus is Fabiola Alvarez Yurcisin's "Saturated Fish Net," a wall-filling installation made mostly of hand-stitched VHS tape, a symbol of obsolescence. A bucket filled with water is a miniature sea, while small silhouettes of Mexico and the United States represent the countries of the artist's birth and current home, respectively. In a show dedicated to the light, this assemblage is a potent black whole.

It's the little things! More than 600 tiny treasures in stone, oil, pastel, and print travel to the Mansion from around the world for this ever-popular juried exhibition. From the size of a postcard down to a postage stamp, petite portraiture, still life, sculpture, and collage capture the world in miniature. And these mini marvels aren't just about making small art—they are about the ability of the miniaturist to captivate and enchant the viewer with a refined object that doesn't disappoint when you move in for a closer look.

Active for 83 years now, The Miniature Painter, Sculptor & Gravers Society of Washington, DC, was sponsored by the renowned miniaturist Alyn Williams. He first established the Royal Miniature Society in England in 1895 and came to Washington to teach in the Corcoran School of Art.
