Definition of perspective drawing: "Perspective drawing gives a threedimensional feeling. In art, it is a system of representing the way that objects appear to get smaller and closer together the further away they are in the scene."

SAG' February meeting will take a hands on look at basic perspective and how it applies to everything we draw and paint. Without perspective there is no sense of depth. If the vertical lines aren't straight the building or object will take on a look of being crooked or falling over. Of course, that's not a bad thing as long as that's the look we want for an old barn, but if we're are drawing a new building we won't want it to look like its ready collapse!

Artists' know perspective is key when drawing a landscape. The first thing we decide is where to place the horizon line. We all know it the artwork will more interesting if our horizon line doesn't cut the drawing or painting in half. We then rely on one point perspective to add a road, path,

We use two point perspective when we add buildings to our landscapes. However, do you think about perspective when you are drawing objects in a still life, a car or deciding the correct size of the people in your beach scenes and cityscapes?

We think of perspective when we draw straight lines for a building, but it's also important when trying to determine the shape of the oval top when drawing a glass or round object. How do we know if the curves of the top and bottom of a cylindrical object should curve up or down? How do you figure out the size of tires on a car or even flowers in a field? It's all a matter of perspective.

Practice makes perfect. If you struggle with perspective drawing, start out by keeping things simple. Buy or go back and read a good basic book on perspective. Some of the best books are written for children. Now draw all the illustrations/examples in the book. Then draw objects around you from three eye views: below, even (on the horizon), then above your eye level. A stack of a few books, a cup, a single object. Pick simple things to draw then lightly draw 2 point perspective boxes and fit that object in the box. Print out a black and white photo, tape it to a large sheet of newspaper then draw perspective lines on top of the original drawing. Now you have a great visual on where the vanishing points will be for everything in your drawing. It's a fun way to "doodle" and you will find as your knowledge of how to use basic perspective grows it will make painting so much easier.

As with all new places, there was a bit of confusion on which doors are unlocked at our January meeting.

There are only 2 doors open for access to the auditorium.

- 1) From Bath: The front door beneath the steeple. Go to the right.
- 2) From the lower lot on Grace St. there is an entry. Go up the stairs immediately on your left.

DIRECTIONS: to 4734 Bath St, Springfield, VA 22150

1) From Old Keene Mill Rd turn onto Hanover. (Turn at the light at the 7-11, one light west of the Richard Byrd library)

Please note: There is NO street parking on Bath unless you have a <u>handicap parking</u> sticker. There is limited <u>handicap parking</u> in the driveway on Bath. There are no steps if you enter at the main door beneath the steeple.

Good Ideas and Free Advice, Chapter One of <u>Alla Prima</u>, by Richard Schmid

This is from a classic book from a renown artist, and his advice and ideas are appropriate for all mediums. I have abridged his comments a lot. If you want to see the full chapter or, better yet, read the whole book, you can read it for free via a web site called Scribd. You must create an account, but then you get to read this book, among others, for free for 30 days. (Then cancel the account if you wish.)

Schmid's thoughts:

<u>**Talent</u>** - Don't bother about whether or not you have it. Just assume you do, and then forget about it. And don't blame any failures on the lack of it - that is really a cop-out. You can learn the skills required for painting in the same way you can learn anything else.</u>

Learning - Don't be afraid to learn. A lot of otherwise intelligent people believe that only spontaneity matters. I've always had trouble with that. If you are going to master a skill it is not wise to ignore what is already known. While you are in a learning mode, suspend your "arty" sensitivities. Focus on problem solving.

Failure - Profit from your failed paintings. Find out what you may be doing wrong and don't do it again. Mistakes are part of being human. So what?

<u>Your code</u> - Underlying all your choices should be your personal scruples, the standards and rules you set for yourself. Don't take advice unless you understand it. Without mindless imitation, don't be shy about stealing good ideas. All artist have done that.

<u>Vigilance</u> - Painting never gets easy. Once you get the fundamentals you will no longer crank out the turkeys, but don't expect masterpieces to emerge effortlessly.

Confidence - Self-doubt is crippling to painters. No one knows "what it takes"... so how could anyone know if they don't have it? Always give yourself the benefit of the doubt.

<u>En Garde</u> - Serious painting is not recreation or therapy or hell raising. It is a visual language and to say something worthwhile you must be fully conscious. You need clear thinking to paint. Be good to yourself - take breaks.

<u>Keep it Simple</u> - Don't go overboard with exotic or complex ways to paint. Don't wish for "secrets" of the masters either. The only secret was what they knew. Beware the lure of ostentatious techniques. Flashy tricks will not make your point stronger.

Bedrock - There is no limit to the number of ways a subject can be rendered and still look unmistakably authentic. Each paint stroke has 4 main characteristics - color, value, edges and drawing. Those are the only things that get onto out canvases. Art happens in the mind of the viewer. **Finishing** - You are finished when you've said what you wish to say.

About the Process - Treat each painting session as a time to solve a specific problem. Once you have decided what it is about your subject that you wish to paint, ignore the rest of what you see. Painting is not a challenge to render everything in sight. A painting finished from edge to edge but poorly done is a waste of paint.

Control - However you choose to paint, get it accurate in every *necessary* respect. That does not mean "tight" or detailed. Looseness is not a frivolous departure from control, quite the opposite. Looseness should describe how a painting looks - not how it is done. Never knowingly leave anything wrong on your canvas.

<u>Wrong</u> - Wrong is anything on my canvas that doesn't look like what I intend it to look like. Whenever you put something on your painting that bothers you, don't leave it there. Although sometimes difficult to pinpoint, colors that don't belong or things badly drawn will disturb until they are corrected.

<u>Preliminaries</u> - Paintings must be done stroke by stroke. Much of what goes on at the start is prep work and will not look right until the final brushwork is laid over it. Once I have established where the major elements of my subject will be placed, I switch my thinking toward accurate work. **Speed** - Slow down for the hard parts. Work only as fast as accuracy will allow.

The Main Dish - Once you know where you want to put everything, don't make random strokes anymore. This amounts to aimless daubing in the vain hope of accidentally making the right one. Your painting should have a minimum of trial and error. Verify what you are seeing on the subject for its shape, value, length, thickness, color, edges, and so on. Stepping back frequently and using a mirror are excellent ways to check for correctness.

When Things Go Wrong - Experience tells me that technical difficulties occur in only three areas the subject, the circumstances, or in me. My painting is never to blame. Errors can occur within only one of the 4 visible elements: color, values, drawing or edges. Schmidt provides here a long checklist of common mistakes and difficulties...

ARTIST TRADING CARDS: AN INVITATION

To all S.A.G. artists and photographers: I invite you to share your art skills and works with me and each other via **ARTIST TRADING CARDS.**

ABOUT: While trading cards can and are used as very fine art and money-worthy collectible ACEO (Art Cards Editions and Originals), I invite you to use ATCs as a means of collecting a tiny piece of each other's' skills and art work. While I may not have room on my walls or money in my wallet to purchase your work, it would still be nice to have a small sample of your work.

HOW: Bring your artist cards to each meeting to trade with others who want to do ATC trading. (We already have DVDs, and art publications to share and recycle, the ATCs would be another way to share more personal art skills and tips as souvenirs.) This would also be another nice way to stay connected to each other's artist-sides.



MAKING THE CARDS: The size is exact and this is the <u>only rule you really should follow</u>: The cards must be 2 ½" X 3 ½" (69mm X 89mm). This is the same size as a playing card, or a baseball/sports trading card.. (in fact...covering a playing card with a design is a great way to make a unique ATC!). Use any media, draw, paint, collage, stitch, ballpoint pen, colored pencil, gouache etc. Many members are watercolorists, and likely have good watercolor paper that you have trimmed. While you can purchase pre-cut blank cards, use those valuable scraps and cut your own stack of correctly sized blanks. Use cardstock, plastic, rice paper etc. Consider gluing light weight papers onto another piece of sturdier backing. Be creative, and use what you have. If you are a frugal artist, you likely have a wonderful store of materials from which to choose! Photographers: don't exclude yourselves! If you have old photos that were lab trials....or you are doing studio clean out, or digital works that didn't quite work...please cut them up and **share them**!! (Glue them to a playing card!)

CARDS APPROACH: I use two methods: either the cards are unrelated with mixed media and mixed subject matters, or they are themed as in an "edition". You might consider doing an "edition" for, perhaps a March meeting where every



card is green, has shamrocks, and celebrates St. Patrick's Day. While not making that series ALL the same, they are 'themed'. (You may come up with different approaches, landscapes, snow scenes, still life, people, pets, all holidays, or all seasons, or some other fun topic for your personal approaches.)

IDENTIFICATION: On the back of each card, put your name, date, and any other info you want: perhaps your email, or website. I suggest you title the card, and if it is part of an edition, use the printmaker way of identifying them: 1 of 10, 2 of 10, 3 of 10 etc. Then the receiving artist knows they have something you have done in either a series, or in random topic. If you have done the series for a special event, then mark it so, for example: JAMS, or JUNE S.A.G.MTG, or other kind of event.

STORAGE: Be creative. Keep the cards in a plastic bag, an envelope, a notebook with plastic multi-sections like an old photo album. Make it work FOR YOU. I have adjusted a gift

box with sections made from foam core board and glued into the box. I leave signs that tell traders to take one and leave one 'here' with the arrow. I use this same box to keep blanks, cards in progress, and finished cards. It is my work-box for TV watching entertainment times. The photos show some boxes. The storage aspect is just another place for you to be creative! Be prepared to decide how you will keep and store those cards ("other people's treasures") that you have

received and do not want to part with at subsequent trading opportunities. In the photo below, the small black fold over containers are how I store my "other peoples' treasures". I enjoy getting those out and looking through them for enjoyment....and motivational ideas!

Last year I stumbled across the **LIGHT SPACE & TIME Online Gallery** on Facebook. I decided to enter their Abstract Art competition just for fun and because for only \$24.00 I could submit pieces for jurying AND I did not have to deliver and pick up the pieces. (and because I rarely do any abstract work so it would be fun to see where this went.) I did not even mind the \$24.00 entry fee and viewed it as contributing to the worldwide ART cause. A month or so later, it was my big surprise to receive notification that the abstract I submitted received an award. Nice enough.... but to find that there were some 1100 entries from lots of countries in the world, made the news even more special.

A few months ago I saw the gallery's call for entries in an all women exhibition; I encouraged my painting friend, and SAG member, to submit something for the exhibition and joined her. This last month we both got notified that we were awardees.

The gallery received 890 entries from 32 different countries from around the world, including Australia, Austria, Bahrain, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Canada, China, Costa Rica, Croatia, Czech Republic, Dubai, Estonia, France, Germany, Hungary, India, Ireland, Italy, Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, Poland, Russia, Saudi Arabia, Scotland, South Africa, South Korea, Spain, Taiwan, United Kingdom and the Ukraine. In addition, the gallery received entries from 41 different states.

The exhibition has been divided into three media categories. Painting & Other Media, Photography & Digital Media and 3 Dimensional Art. In addition, there is an overall Winning Artists Category, which is the "best of the best" and consists of the ten (10) best entries comprised from the 3 media categories. The gallery included Special Merit awards and Special Recognition awards for outstanding art. Many of the artists in either of these groups could have easily been included in the upper tier of our winners, as their art was also exceptional.

Select the "All Women's Exhibition". To view the artwork in each media category, click on a thumbnail image and that will take you to the Slide Show, which will then contain larger images. In order to leave the Slide Show at any time, just click on any of the large images in order to escape and that will take you back to the thumbnails images. (While you are at their home page, check out the other exhibitions and their archived shows as well.)

All winning entries will be featured on the Light Space & Time website for the month of January

Overall Winning Artists Category – The overall winning artist's category consists of the 10 Best Entries received from the 3 different media categories.

Special Merit Award Category – These are the artists and their artwork which they felt could easily have been placed higher but due to the size constraints in the Overall Category and in each media category, this art was placed in this special category. Any of the Special Merit art, in many cases, is interchangeable with the best art that we selected for the top tiers.

Painting & Other Category – The painting & other category is considered to be any art where a pigment was applied to a two-dimensional surface, such as canvas, paper, or panel. This category comprises the following media; acrylics, oil, pastels, watercolor, gouache, tempera, ink, line type drawings, encaustic, fresco, fabric and mixed media, etc. applied on canvas, canvas board, paper or any other flat surface. Photography & Digital Category – This category contains any images captured by either an analog or digital camera and would be viewed as a print. Black and white photographs, color photographs, digital or analog photographs, photo grams, other experimental photography, alternative photographic processes, manipulated photography etc. would be included in this category.

3 Dimensional Art Category – This category contains any art which has or seeming to have length, width, and depth. Relief, pottery, sculpture, installation, kinetic, and conceptual 3-D artworks created in metal, paper, wood, stone, fiber, plastics, glass, ceramics, trash or any other material which can be used to create 3 dimensional art. 



Itinerary and Accommodations: 4 nights in Madrid, 3 nights in Seville, and 2 nights in Ronda. On this ten-day trip, participants will enjoy the rich treasures of Spanish art and the pleasures of creating a sketchbook diary along the way. We'll carry only very

portable sketching supplies, allowing us to combine time for sketching on site with visits to see Spain's rich artistic and architectural history. Before the trip, we'll have a half-day outdoor sketching class at The Art League.

Thursday, August 31, 2017: Evening departure from Washington, D.C. to Madrid, with morning arriv al on September 1. Our hotel in Madrid will be a short walk from the Prado, one of the world's premier museums with an incomparable collection of Spanish art including Goya, Velasquez, and Ribera. We'll also visit the beautifully preserved home and studio of famed Spanish painter Joachim Sorolla, Spain's Royal Palace; and take a day trip to Toledo, a small and beautifully preserved hill town where El Greco lived and painted, with time for us to sketch the panorama he made famous.

On September 4, we'll travel to Sev ille by high-speed train. Seville is famous for its beautiful 17th century Spanish architecture with its magnificent cathedral, the Moorish Alcazar, historic Jewish ghetto within the Barrio Santa Cruz, as well as the Museo de Bellas Artes, with works by Murillo and Zubaran.

Our last three days will be spent in Ronda, the most beautiful of Spain's famous white hill towns, perched across a spectacular gorge, with its historic bull ring and museum. There will be an optional tour to the Pileta Cave, discovered in 1905, with symbols and images of fish and animals created by paleolithic people as much as 25,000 years ago. Because it is privately owned, it offers a unique opportunity to see pre-historic art.

Late in the day on September 9, we'll return to Madrid on a scenic high speed train for our final night.
