

# **Deborah Conn Presents at SAG's March Meeting**

Deborah Conn is primarily a watercolorist, but she works in acrylics, collage, and various forms of drawing media as well. Her favorite subjects are people.



Conn spent several years focusing on figures, and later found herself wanting to paint only faces and most recently, to paint





them large. Her love for pattern and texture led her to use those elements in clothing, backgrounds, and occasionally drifting across the subject. She incorporated hand-painted collage papers into her work and has lately brought that texture into the face itself, using a surface of crumpled tissue, allowing the paint to flow into random nooks and crannies, but controlling it where needed.

"The gessoed surface allows me to lift paint," she says, "which means I can respond as the painting progresses, turning it into an interplay between my intentions and the emerging work."

Conn's paintings have been shown at the Torpedo Factory and Green Spring Gardens in Alexandria, Strathmore Hall in Rockville, the National Watercolor 2016 exhibit in California, and a number of local and regional exhibits. She is a signature member of Potomac Valley Watercolorists, the Baltimore Watercolor Society, and the Virginia Watercolor Society.

# Your Perspective is Unique, Unlike That of Anyone Else

#### More Perspective Drawing tips

This article is to follow up to our SAG's February 8th meeting with more tips on perspective drawing and


techniques. What's great about perspective is it is a learned skill that everyone can do with practice.

Perspective drawing is a technique used to transform 3-dimensional images on a 2-D plane.

My challenge for the February meeting was to create not only a program for all levels, but to craft exercises that could be done in an hour and a half. I decided focus on the basics of

perspective with exercises on:

1) how to use perspective to find the eye level (horizon photograph; 2) drawing using one point perspective; and two-point perspective to draw simple boxes above, on the horizon line.



The great thing about drawing simple boxes in one and two point perspective is they can be used as the bases for creating buildings, bridges, cylindrical objects, and much, much more.

Do you paint/draw from photographs? If so, why is it important to determine where the eye level/horizon line is before you get started drawing or painting? If you know where it is that can help you figure out why a painting/drawing might not be working. Then the question is once you establish eye level/horizon line are you looking at the BOTTOM of everything above that line and the TOP of everything below eye level? Sometimes, it is as simple as that.

With time limitations, I was not able to share tips on how to draw stairs or size figures in a scene using perspective. Some participants asked me for diagrams on how to draw round or cylindrical objects like bike and car tires which I've included here.


I have found a few tutorial videos I think will help anyone struggling with those issues. First, I would like to give a shout out to all the artists who share their knowledge through online videos on everything imaginable including perspective. I could (and probably have) spend weeks reviewing videos. I learn something new every time I watch a video. For this article, my criteria was to find videos that are fairly short and have simple lessons that we can try ourselves, but there are so many really good videos on perspective and I could only choose a few. I encourage everyone to find and watch other tutorials too.


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

## **NOTICE:** Increase in SAG Dues

Due to Fairfax library system policy changes for scheduling meeting rooms last year, SAG began having problems reserving the library for our monthly meetings. Previously, we'd been able to reserve Wednesday nights for six months at a time. With the change, the board was scrambling to find alternate

locations last fall when the library was not available. Springfield Town Center graciously allowed us to use their facility twice free of charge, but additional uses would cost \$200 a night.

Besides the difficulties finding an available and affordable location, the monthly location changes added confusion for everyone to remember where the meeting would be held. The board worked hard to find a new location that had space available for the rest of the year (Jan – June). Grace Church was selected due to its availability, location, large meeting room and reasonable rent. With the loss of the library venue came a new expenditure, a monthly rental fee.

For our newer members, SAG paid rent for our meetings prior to being provided free space for 3-4 years at the Springfield Mall while the mall was in transition to close down. When the mall closed in 2012, SAG made arrangements to hold our meetings the Richard Bryd Library.

SAG's dues have not been increased for at least 20 years. Many of our expenses have gone up in the last 20 years, but with the additional expense of having to pay rent an increase of dues is necessary. On February 13, 2017, the Board approved a \$10 increase for general membership and \$15 increase for family membership.

#### **Robert Burridge Studio**

#### BobBlast Issue #138 - Struggles with the Color Green | 2.20.17

Every week I am excited when I find a wonderful "BobBlast" newsletter in my inbox and can't wait to watch it. I am amazed at the wonder videos <u>Robert Burridge</u> shares and they are all on his <u>website</u>. I've mentioned before, if you haven't signed up for his newsletter, I would highly recommend it. They are great! I learn something from every one of them. I think you will too regardless of your preferred medium....Lydia Jechorek

This week Bob talks about working with green. A tough color for almost everyone to master. Be sure to watch his video. Here's what Bob wrote about green:

#### Welcome back to another BobBlast!

#### Dial it Back

Green paint... right out of the tube - it unnerves me. It appears too raw or acidic. This is what I do to make it work for me.

I put a couple of different greens down on my palette - then I mix in another color, depending what I am after. Adding white paint obviously lightens the color towards a pastel look - also known as a high-key color, light and airy.

In previous BobBlasts, I have demonstrated how I neutralize a color by mixing in a tiny amount of its complementary color. Adding a bit of red, the color green will dial back to a softer green.

Or, at times, I add a bit of black to dial back a color... but not too much black or you will kill the color into a dull mud.

Here is Bob's video "Dial it Back"

My favorite mid-tone green to work with is made by mixing yellow, white and black. This mix creates a grey-green-sage color. I then mix into this mid-tone green a variety of green colors directly from the tube. Also - the complementary colors will pop off the page!

I played with this approach with my least favorite color (green) and by the end of the day, it became one of my favorite exercises to face head-on what bothers me!

I learn a lot more about color and painting by practicing and painting... a lot more! Bob

This exhibit reflects on the metaphor "breaking the glass ceiling", pushing through a tough, not quite invisible barrier that keeps many from reaching their full potential, their dreams beyond a certain level in a hierarchy or in society. Breaking glass, breaking barriers, reaching beyond traditional boundaries, stretching beyond one's own and society's current limits, only accepting the limits of an endless sky have been a theme for many artists and reflect a very current theme.

This year Del Ray Artisans celebrates 25 years of supporting visual artists; providing equal access to all has always been at the center of its mission. Inclusion of all to provide a space and to advance beyond set boundaries is as important today as it was 25 years ago.

Entry to this exhibit is by online submission. Art may be two- or three-dimensional, and in any medium. No strict size limits, but please be considerate of other artists and the physical limits of the gallery before entering oversized pieces. Oversized pieces of merit will be accepted if space permits. Art should be ready to hang or display with wire and screw eyes, mounting and/or display stand, framed, matted, or with edges finished. We cannot show work that is not ready for exhibition. #### **Entry Details:**

- Open to all area artists.
- Artists may submit up to three (3) pieces of artwork. The entry fee is \$5 per entry for Del Ray Artisans members and \$10 per entry for non-members. Deadline for online submission of your art is midnight on Sunday, March 19, 2017.
- Entry fees are due upon submission and are non-refundable pay with cash, check, or credit card at the gallery or by credit card online at: <a href="https://squareup.com/store/del-ray-artisans/item/breaking-the-glass-ceiling-entry-fee">https://squareup.com/store/del-ray-artisans/item/breaking-the-glass-ceiling-entry-fee</a>
- You must provide one photo for each entry. Acceptable file types are: pdf, jpg, jpeg, png, and gif; up to 5MB in file size. Smart phone photos are acceptable. You may also choose to provide one additional photograph per entry (not required). You must name your files as follows: "YourLastName-FirstName-Entry1,"

- "YourLastName-FirstName-Entry2", etc. If you provide a second photo for an entry, add a "b" to the end e.g. "YourLastName-FirstName-Entry1b".
- Final acceptance for this exhibit will be at the curators' discretion upon physically viewing accepted artwork at Artwork Receiving.
- All artwork must be for sale. We will not accept pieces marked "NFS". This exhibit will have an
  associated "Art-To-Go" marketplace opportunity. Bin art/matting should be 18"x24" or less to fit safely into
  our print racks.
- Smaller bin submissions must be attached to a foam core at least 8"x10".
- 3D Marketplace entries must be small (no larger than 8"x10"x8")
- Art-To-Go entries will be accepted during Artwork Receiving on Sunday, March 26, 2017 from 6-8pm and Monday, March 27, 2017 from 6-8pm.
- Art-To-Go entry fees are \$3 per piece, or \$10 for up to 5 pieces.
- There is a maximum of five Art-To-Go items per artist.
- We will provide a separate entry form for Art-To-Go entries and fees are payable when the art is delivered at Artwork Receiving.

#### **Accepted Artist Requirements:**

- When art sells, each artist is asked to make a 20% tax-deductible donation to Del Ray Artisans.
- Del Ray Artisans and the City of Alexandria cannot be held liable for any loss or damage to artwork at any time. Insurance for artwork is the sole responsibility of the artist.
- Permission to reproduce any artwork for Del Ray Artisans publicity and archival purposes is automatically granted by the artist as a requisite for entering the show. Anyone not agreeing must contact the Curating Director at Curating@DelRayArtisans.org
- Work previously shown at Del Ray Artisans gallery is not eligible.
- All art entered must be original: No reproductions. Contact the curator for more information.
- All artists participating in this exhibit are required to volunteer a minimum of 3 hours towards managing the show. Those hours can be filled by gallery hosting during the month of exhibit, assisting with show hanging or take down, and volunteering to help during reception or for other show specific activities as needed by the curator.
- No early pickup. All art must remain the entire length of the show unless sold in a "cash and carry" show or arrangements have been made in advance with the curator and Curating Director.
- All taxes, including sales taxes upon sale of artwork, are the responsibility of the artist.
